With the Academy of the Ukrainian press, he also deals with training of working journalists, students, people of different ages, understanding how journalism works, engaging the audience, evaluating the effectiveness, teaching them how to spot fake news, how to look out for quality standards of journalism and how to evaluate sources, focuses on the importance of making the audience resilient against fake news, propaganda and manipulation, and how journalists can contribute to this task – especially in Ukraine’s current situation.
